Deaconesses hold important roles in various religious communities, providing support, care, and guidance. Your dedication to serving others in this capacity is commendable. Remember that your work makes a positive difference in people's lives. Embrace the challenges with a compassionate heart, knowing that your efforts contribute to the well-being of others. Stay strong, stay inspired, and know that you are appreciated for the valuable role you play. Keep up the great work! Below are the job description, duties, and responsibilities of the deaconesses' body.

Job Description- Duties of the Deaconess

You have been asked to serve as a deaconess in the church. The God who calls is able to sustain you as you cooperate with Him. The ministry to which a person is called when she is a deaconess includes the following duties:

- 1) **Report to Head Deaconess.** Deaconess will assist in maintaining the smooth operation of church meetings. Any needs and/or concerns should be reported to the Head Deaconess as soon as possible so that they could be addressed in an adequate manner. A quarterly meeting is to be scheduled by the Head Deaconess to address various issues and provide training.
- 2) **Visitation and Support-** Head Deaconess will coordinate deaconesses (and other interested church members) to provide card and visitation ministry to church members who are:
 - a) shut-in
 - b) sick
 - c) bereaved
- 3) Reclaiming missing members and backsliders
- 4) **Compassion Ministries-** The deaconesses are to do their part in caring for the sick, the needy, and the unfortunate. Organize and participate in outreach initiatives to help those in need such as:
 - a) Distributing food to the needy
 - b) Distributing clothing to the homeless
 - c) Volunteering at shelters
 - d) Organizing community events
- 5) **Assisting with the Baptismal Ceremony.** The traditional roles for this service are described below:
 - a) The deacons will:
 - i) Prepare and fill the pool.
 - ii) Assist male candidates as they prepare for the baptism
 - b) The deaconesses will:
 - i) Prepare the robes for all who are participating.

- ii) Assist female candidates.
- iii) Launder and store robes, towels, etc., after the ceremony
- 6) **Coordinate Fellowship Meals-** The assigned deaconesses will be responsible for the following items:
 - a) Warm and serve food for fellowship dinners
 - b) They will ensure the tables are covered with tablecloths
 - c) They will ensure the dishes are washed and the kitchen is clean after everyone is finished
- 7) **Assisting with the Communion Service**. The traditional roles for this service are described below.
 - a. The deaconesses will:
 - i. Prepare the bread and grape juice.
 - ii. Arrange the emblems and covering on the table.
 - iii. Dispense water and basins for the women during the Ordinance of Humility, giving attention and assistance to visitors, new members, and the aged.
 - iv. Assist in the ordinance of foot-washing, giving special aid to women visitors or those who have newly joined the church.
 - v. Clean and store the linens and serving pieces used in Communion.
 - b. It is appropriate for either deacons or deaconesses, who have been ordained, to assist in distributing the emblems and uncovering and recovering the table during the service.
- 8) **Caring for the Congregation**. In many congregations, an unwritten tradition gives the women who serve as deaconesses the responsibility of preparing hot meals for any church family that experiences a death or other tragedy. This may mean simply taking food to the home or, in some cases, the serving of an entire meal to family and guests after a funeral.
- 9) **Women's Ministries** Deaconesses can lead, and support programs specifically designed for women within the church such as:
 - a) Bible studies
 - b) Mentoring
- 10) Assist in funeral services

COMMUNION BREAD

It is important for each deaconess to learn how to make the communion bread. Here is a simple recipe for making the communion bread.

Unleavened Bread Recipe for the Lord's Supper

- 1/2 Cup of Olive Oil
- 1/2 Cup of Water
- 1/4 tsp. Salt
- 2 Cups of Whole Wheat Flour Whatever you use, make sure it is **whole wheat**. You can tell if the flour is brown.
- 1. Preheat the oven to 350 F
- 2. Combine the olive oil, water, and salt. Wisk it with a whisk or a fork until its near-frothy white. Alternatively, you can put it in a blender instead.
- 3. Loosely mix the flour to the blend. You don't want to mix it too much or glutton chains will start to form. When making normal bread, this is desirable. But, since we're making unleavened bread, it will make it too hard.
- 4. Make sure the dough is the same consistency of a drier batch of cookie dough.
- 5. Grease a cookie sheet well with a hard fat like Crisco, Smart Balance, or any other Trans Fat/Saturated Fat.
- 6. Roll the dough flat (as thin as pie crust). I find it helpful using a hand roller
- 7. Once the dough is flat, it is necessary to make some incisions so that bubbles will not form in the baking process. I like to cut it into cracker-like squares. If you want to keep larger pieces, simply make a sizable incision every 6-12 inches.
- 8. Bake for about 10 minutes. Watch it constantly after 9 minutes to avoid burn. Browned (not just burnt) communion bread tastes bitter. Adjust the time for crispier or flimsier bread.
- 9. Makes 12-16 servings

BIBLE TEXTS

The Bible does not explicitly mention the role of "deaconesses," but there are passages that refer to women involved in serving and ministering in the early Christian church. Here are a few verses that are often considered relevant to the concept of deaconesses:

- 1. Romans 16:1-2: "I commend to you our sister Phoebe, a deacon of the church in Cenchreae. I ask you to receive her in the Lord in a way worthy of his people and to give her any help she may need from you, for she has been the benefactor of many people, including me."
- 2. 1 Timothy 3:11: "In the same way, the women are to be worthy of respect, not malicious talkers but temperate and trustworthy in everything."
- 3. Acts 9:36-39: This passage speaks about Tabitha (also known as Dorcas), a disciple known for her acts of kindness and charity to the poor.
- 4. Acts 16:14-15: Lydia, a businesswoman, is described as a worshipper of God and someone who extended hospitality to the apostle Paul and his companions.
