OVER 100 BAPTIZED IN ELDERS' & LAY PREACHERS' BAPTISM DAY



MONTEGO BAY, JAMAICA – In a historic demonstration of lay leadership and evangelistic zeal, the West Jamaica Conference of Seventh-day Adventists celebrated its annual Elders' and Lay Preachers' Baptism Day on Saturday, April 25, 2026. The event saw more than 70 elders and lay preachers transition from the pulpit to the baptismal waters, advancing the mission and expanding the kingdom through personal mentorship.

Leading up to the day, the Conference issued a clear mandate to its spiritual leaders: every elder and lay preacher was challenged to "take up the mantle" and prepare three candidates for baptism. This targeted approach to soul-winning resulted in a significant harvest of 113 new believers across the region.

The spiritual impact was felt across all four parishes within the conference territory:

- **St. James: 45 baptisms**
- **Westmoreland: 40 baptisms**
- **St. Elizabeth: 21 baptisms**
- **Hanover: 7 baptisms**

The Initiative was designed to emphasize the active role of local church elders, allowing them to finalize the spiritual journey with those they have personally mentored, studied the Bible with, and

prayed for and with up to that point.

Pastor Vencot Dyer, Ministerial Secretary for the West Jamaica Conference, noted that the success of the program lies in its alignment with God's divine will.

"The Elders' and Lay Preachers' Baptism Day was once again a tremendous success! It was a joy to see elders standing in the water baptizing those they have worked with, including members of their families," Dyer stated. "I believe that this program truly aligns with the will of heaven. Oh, what joy it will be in heaven when we all get there."

The initiative did more than just increase church membership; it strengthened the vital bond between conference leadership and the laity. By empowering elders to officiate the sacred rite, the West Jamaica Conference continues to foster a collaborative spirit of outreach. As the "plenteous harvest" continues to be gathered, the Elders' and Lay Preachers' Baptism Day stands as a testament to what can be achieved when every leader answers the call to the frontline.

RETIREMENT YOUTH DEPARTMENT EXTENDS GLOBAL YOUTH DAY IMPACT

On Sunday, March 22, 2026, the Retirement Youth Department of the Seventh-day Adventist Church extended its Global Youth Day initiative into a dynamic outreach effort aimed at creating a lasting impact on the surrounding community.

The day began in Gutters with a cleanup at the home of a resident severely affected by Hurricane Melissa. Still recovering from the emotional and physical toll of her loss, the homeowner was assisted by the youth and church family in clearing debris and restoring order to her property. This work prepared the space for rebuilding efforts, which the team has committed to supporting. The group worked diligently; cutting, cleaning, and removing damaged materials to provide both practical assistance and emotional encouragement.

Following the cleanup, the team joined other youth volunteers at an elderly wellness booth. This initiative provided holistic care for senior citizens and local residents, including blood pressure and glucose testing, professional foot care for diabetics, and general grooming services.

This segment of the outreach was made possible through sponsorship by the mobile salon business, Sip 'n Style by Shav. By providing on-site equipment including portable wash stations, dryers, and professional tools, the business, along with a team of volunteers, ensured that elderly women were pampered with hair styling and men received professional grooming. Every participant was treated with dignity, ensuring they felt valued and refreshed.

A notable highlight was the ripple effect of the prior Sabbath outreach, during which over 100 care packages were distributed. During those visits, the team met a young woman who was so inspired by the sincerity of the youth that she volunteered at the wellness booth.

Reflecting on her time with the team she said, "I am so thankful for the chance to contribute to the community impact project. I truly appreciate being accepted by the team, as I know you could have turned me away. I'm genuinely happy that I volunteered and was able to stay involved; from the moment I arrived, I felt incredibly

welcomed. I thoroughly enjoyed the work, the overall experience, and getting to know everyone. It is something I would absolutely do again.”

Furthermore, a local community barber was invited to serve as the lead groomer. This partnership provided him with professional exposure as part of the church's commitment to uplifting local businesses. He expressed deep gratitude, noting that the prayers and support extended to his business have already led to noticeable growth.

Special attention was given to inclusivity, with transportation arranged for shut-ins and individuals with special needs, including those with visual impairments and Down syndrome. Health education was also a primary focus; participants received guidance on nutrition and lifestyle practices to manage conditions like hypertension and diabetes. Alongside informational pamphlets, Priorities magazines were distributed to offer spiritual upliftment.

Youth Congress in Puerto Rico Mobilizes Digital Evangelism Movement

More than 200 young people gather for special initiative, blending faith, service, and social media outreach to advance the mission.

More than 200 young people recently gathered in Arecibo, Puerto Rico, for a Seventh-day Adventist Church initiative aimed at equipping youth to use digital platforms for evangelism and positive influence.

Held under the theme “Rise & Serve,” the event held, March 14, brought together 240 participants for a full-day, hands-on experience that combined worship, reflection, and community outreach with practical training in digital mission.

Organized by the North Puerto Rican Conference, the congress emphasized moving beyond theory by integrating service and online engagement, encouraging participants to actively share their faith in meaningful ways.

“This call to rise and shine, inspired by the prophet Isaiah, has been central to this congress,” said Edmundo Aquino, communication director of the North Puerto Rican Conference. “Now more than ever, the church—especially young people—must

embrace that calling amid today’s challenges, using both traditional and nontraditional methods to share the gospel and connect with others.”

Aquino explained that the congress is the first initiative of its kind led by the communication department specifically designed for youth, offering a practical, faith-based approach to digital evangelism.

Youth for Mission in the Digital Space

The program also featured a panel discussion led by university students Janiel Colón, Gabriella Tolentino, Leilani Cancel, and Sebastián Adorno, volunteer hosts *Unfiltered*—a Hope Media Puerto Rico podcast engaging young people aimed at engaging young people aged 15 to 25 by addressing everyday topics from a biblical perspective. The group addressed topics such as the impact of social media on spiritual life, the pressure to conform online, and the importance of authenticity in digital spaces.

Participants were invited to reflect on their own content consumption and consider how their platforms could be transformed into tools for evangelism.

“Social media is not the enemy; the problem is when we fail to share our faith consistently,” Aquino emphasized, noting that the mission field extends far beyond physical spaces into the digital world where millions interact daily.



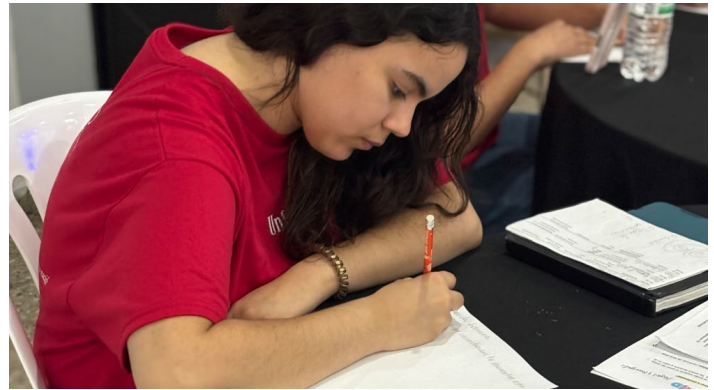

Guest speaker Pastor Kelvin Rodríguez challenged attendees to live their faith intentionally, reminding them of their influence. “God does not have to call you to be a disciple for you to understand that you are a person of influence,” he said, encouraging young people to recognize opportunities to serve and reflect God’s love in everyday life.

Action Through Community Service

The congress also saw young participants engaging in community service activities such as writing letters to incarcerated individuals, visiting children’s and elderly homes, conducting drive-through prayer initiatives, and distributing books and magazines.

“It was very moving to write letters to people deprived of freedom, pray for them without knowing them, and ask God to guide my words,” said Leyka Nieves. “It was one of the best experiences I had during the congress.”

Attendees expressed a renewed commitment to sharing their faith online. “We need to use our phones to share the love of Jesus, because almost all young people are on social media, and we can do a lot to reach them,” said 16-year-old student Yabrieliz Vargas.

The event also served as a starting point for ongoing training in digital evangelism, as organizers plan to equip interested youth with practical skills in the coming weeks.

Organizers said the congress emerged from the *Unfiltered* podcast, which was launched in October 2025 to engage young people through relevant, faith-based conversations.

Called to Engage in OneVoice27

Toward the close of the event, Pastor Luis Rivera, president of the Puerto Rican Union, encouraged young people to use their talents, especially in communication, as powerful tools for mission.

“I called on our youth to use their talents, particularly in media, to impact lives and share the message of the three angels,” Rivera said. He also invited them to actively participate in the global OneVoice27 initiative, announcing that the union will provide financial support to three churches that publicly committed to joining the effort in September 2027.

THE NEUROSCIENCE OF FORGIVENESS

Where Scripture meets science

Q. As a devoted Christian, I've been concerned about my broken relationship with friends from childhood that ended years ago because of silly disagreements. My conscience has been bothering me every time I think about how much life we've wasted. Recently I started reading about what science says about forgiveness, and I would love to get your take on it. Is there any validity to it?

A. When Paul wrote to the Ephesian church, "Instead, be kind to each other, tenderhearted, forgiving one another, just as God through Christ has forgiven you" (Eph. 4:32),^[1] he was issuing more than a moral directive. Modern neuroscience suggests he was prescribing a pathway to psychological liberation and relational healing that literally rewires our brains.

Jesus made the stakes even clearer: "If you forgive those who sin against you, your heavenly Father will forgive you. But if you refuse to forgive others, your Father will not forgive your sins" (Matt. 6:14, 15). These aren't arbitrary commands—they're invitations into the very architecture of human flourishing that God designed into our neurological makeup.

The Brain on Unforgiveness

When we experience betrayal or hurt, our brains respond with a cascade of stress hormones. The amygdala, our brain's threat-detection center, fires up and sounds the alarm. Cortisol floods our system. Our bodies literally enter a state of chronic stress when we rehearse grievances and nurture resentment. Neuroimaging studies show that recalling offenses activates the same neural pathways associated with physical pain—the anterior cingulate cortex and the insula light up as though we're experiencing the wound all over again.

This isn't just metaphorical suffering. Research

published in the *Journal of Behavioral Medicine* demonstrates that chronic unforgiveness correlates with elevated blood pressure, increased cardiovascular problems, compromised immune function, and higher rates of anxiety and depression. When we hold grudges, we're essentially poisoning our neurochemistry, bathing our brains in stress hormones designed for short-term threats, not long-term residence.

The Healing Chemistry of Forgiveness

Forgiveness triggers a dramatically different neurological response. Studies using functional MRI scans reveal that when people engage in genuine forgiveness, activity decreases in areas associated with rumination and emotional pain while increasing in regions linked to empathy and perspective-taking—particularly the prefrontal cortex and the precuneus—often considered a hub for the brain's default mode network (DMN).

The act of forgiveness releases oxytocin, often called the "bonding hormone," which promotes feelings of trust and connection. It also triggers the release of endorphins and dopamine, creating a sense of relief and even pleasure. Fred Luskin's groundbreaking forgiveness research at Stanford University^[2] shows that people who practice forgiveness experience measurable reductions in anger, stress, and hurt, alongside increases in optimism and hopefulness.

The more we practice forgiveness, the better our brains become at managing emotional reactivity.

Perhaps most remarkably, forgiveness strengthens the prefrontal cortex's regulatory control over the amygdala. In practical terms this means that the more we practice forgiveness, the better our brains become at managing emotional reactivity and choosing thoughtful responses over impulsive reactions. We're literally building neural pathways that make grace more automatic and resentment less reflexive.

Forgiveness and Relational Restoration

The neurological benefits extend beyond individual healing into relational transformation. When we forgive, we activate what neuroscientists call "mentalizing networks"—brain regions that help us understand others' mental and emotional states. This increased empathic capacity creates space for genuine reconciliation.

Research on couples shows that partners who practice forgiveness maintain higher relationship satisfaction and demonstrate better conflict resolution skills. Their brains develop what psychologists call "positive sentiment override"—a tendency to interpret ambiguous behaviors charitably rather than suspiciously. This mirrors Paul's description in 1 Corinthians 13:5 that love "keeps no record of being wronged."

Interestingly, the neural benefits of forgiveness don't require the offender's repentance or even presence. Studies show that unilateral forgiveness—the kind Jesus modeled from the cross—still produces psychological and physiological benefits for the forgiver. This validates Christ's teaching that forgiveness liberates the forgiver even more than the forgiven.

Biblical Wisdom, Biological Design

The convergence of scriptural command and neurological research shouldn't surprise us. The God who designed our brains knows what our brains need to thrive. When Scripture calls us to forgive, it's not imposing an impossible burden, but inviting us into the healing our neurology was designed to experience.

The biblical mandate to forgive "just as God through Christ has forgiven you" connects divine grace with human neurobiology. As we receive God's forgiveness, we're experiencing not just spiritual renewal but also neurological recalibration—our brains literally learning a new pattern of grace.

Forgiveness isn't weakness or denial. It's a courageous choice to release the toxic grip of resentment and activate the brain's healing pathways. It's choosing to rewire our neural circuitry

toward peace rather than perpetuating cycles of pain. When Jesus taught us to forgive, He was showing us the pathway home to ourselves, to each other, and ultimately to God.

You are in our prayers as you begin this healing journey of forgiveness through the grace and power of God. Remain encouraged and faithful.
