WHERE FAITH MEETS FOUNDATION: OCEAN HEIGHTS SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST CHURCH BREAKS GROUND

The Ocean Heights Seventh-day Adventist Church in the Lilliput District of Churches broke ground for a new sanctuary on June 28, 2026, marking a defining moment for a congregation that has spent years worshipping in a building far too small for the faith it carries. The church is the youngest in the district, born out of the Lilliput Seventh-day Adventist Church following an evangelistic series. It has since grown to more than 160 members, with between 70 and 90 attending weekly, all of them pressing into a 20-by-40-foot building that was never meant to hold this much life.

WHERE FAITH MEETS FOUNDATION: OCEAN HEIGHTS SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST CHURCH BREAKS GROUND

The Ocean Heights Seventh-day Adventist Church in the Lilliput District of Churches broke ground for a new sanctuary on June 28, 2026, marking a defining moment for a Congregation that has spent years worshipping in a building far too small for the faith it carries. The church is the youngest in the district, born out of the Lilliput Seventh-day Adventist Church following an evangelistic series. It has since grown to more than 160 members, with between 70 and 90 attending weekly, all of them pressing into a 20-by-40-foot building that was never meant to hold this much life.

“The congregation has grown significantly, and the church can no longer hold the congregation”; said Pastor Lataniel Hamilton, who leads the Lilliput District. “We sought to build a new church that will accommodate its membership and cater to the spiritual needs and development of the community.” The vision stretches further still. Government-planned residential developments are expected to bring considerable population growth to the area, and the church is positioning itself to meet those incoming neighbours even before they arrive.

Pastor Vincent Rose delivered the spiritual charge for the occasion, drawing on the biblical tradition of sanctuary-building to challenge the congregation toward boldness. His most memorable illustration

was the ant—a creature that moves objects many times its own size not because it has calculated the odds, but simply because it moves. “God is challenging Ocean Heights to be like that ant,” he said. “Push stuff bigger than yourself.” He was equally clear that the building is not the goal. “God does not love an empty church,” he said. “The church’s mission is not merely to build a pretty church, it is to produce them.”

The congregation answered that charge in the most tangible way possible. Two elders stepped forward to unveil architectural renderings of the proposed structure, each pledging JA\$500,000, a combined million-dollar commitment before a single foundation stone has been laid. Members and district members were also given the privilege of breaking ground themselves, with contributions ranging from JA\$5,000 to JA\$60,000. By the close of the evening, the congregation had raised over JA\$2.5 million for the building fund in a single night.

“That, for me, is an indication that the brethren are fully on board,” said Pastor Hamilton. For Elder Doug Walters, who was experiencing his first groundbreaking, the moment was deeply personal. “I love how our pastor guided us, and to see all the church members excited was such

a good feeling," he said. "I can't wait for more. God bless Ocean Heights."

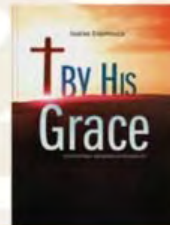
The roots of Ocean Heights run deeper than most realize. The congregation traces its beginnings to the Naseberry Tree Experience, a series of informal gatherings with Elder Collin Wright, alongside Debbie Scarlett, Navy Ennis, Natasha Edwards, Pastor Damaine Phillips, Presley Bingham, and Melford Dockery, with two candidates also emerging from that experience. Those early meetings laid the spiritual groundwork for what would follow. An evangelistic series subsequently led by Pastor Laundale Monroe brought 13 other people to baptism, and by 2014, a branch Sabbath School had been formed, the first formal structure of what would eventually become the Ocean Heights SDA Church.

Foundation work is expected to begin within two to three weeks. Full completion is projected at 15 to 20 years, a timeline Pastor Hamilton offered without apology. "It might not be in my time here as the pastor," he said. "But we are hopeful." Ground has been broken. The hill is waiting. The building will come.

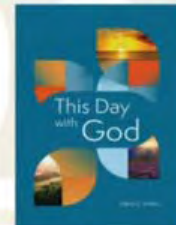

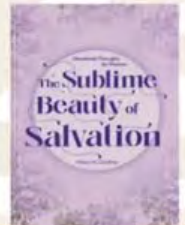

WEST JAMAICA CONFERENCE PINS 154 MENTORS AT HISTORIC FIRST MENTORSHIP DAY

MONTEGO BAY, St. James

The West Jamaica Conference of Seventh-day Adventists reached a major milestone in its mentorship ministry on Sabbath, June 27, as 154 mentors-in-training were officially pinned and recognized during the Conference's first-ever Mentorship Day since the launch of the EYES Mentorship Initiative.

Held at the Seventh-day Adventist Conference Centre, trained mentors and mentors-in-training donned their distinctive red and black uniforms for the grand celebration. The newly minted mentors joined a growing movement designed to provide guidance, support, and positive influence to individuals across western Jamaica. The EYES Mentorship Initiative was the brainchild of then West Jamaica Conference President, Pastor Glen O. Samuels, now President of the Jamaica Union Conference. Since its inception in 2021, the programme has sought to establish sustainable mentoring relationships with at least 500 mentors and 1,000 at-risk youth throughout the Conference territory.

The pinning ceremony in the afternoon was the highlight of the day's proceedings. Another defining moment came as the President of West Jamaica Conference, Pastor Vincent Rose, had the privilege of pinning Mrs. Marion Barrett-Popkin, Treasurer for the conference, who was among those being officially recognized as mentors. The symbolic gesture underscored the Conference's commitment to mentorship at every level of leadership.

According to West Jamaica Conference Mentorship Coordinator, Mrs. Kediesha Mowatt-Grant, the significance of the occasion extends far beyond the number of mentors recognized.

"Each mentor represents a life committed to walking alongside another person, providing guidance and encouragement. So, to see 154 individuals complete the training process and publicly commit themselves to mentorship is a tremendous achievement for our Conference."

Mowatt-Grant explained that the programme was developed in response to a growing need for intentional support systems within both the Church and wider community.

"We recognized that many of our young people and vulnerable individuals needed consistent

support, guidance, and positive role models. The EYES Mentorship Initiative was created to intentionally connect trained mentors with these groups.”

Among those recognized during the ceremony was newly pinned mentor Kevaughn Bernard, who shared the motivation behind his decision to become a mentor.

“I’ve always believed that the lessons life teaches us are not meant to be kept to ourselves. Growing up, I saw firsthand how much of a difference the right guidance at the right time can make. I was motivated by a desire to be that presence for someone else, to help them avoid unnecessary pitfalls and walk with greater confidence into their purpose.”

Bernard said his desire is to help others discover their God-given value and potential. “I hope to help them see themselves the way God sees them, full of potential, and capable of more than they may currently believe.”

The programme’s impact was further highlighted by Thandheka Myers, Parish Liaison Officer for St. Elizabeth, who highlighted the programme’s contribution to the mission of the Church.

“The mentorship programme is essential for the mission of the SDA Church as it facilitates spiritual

growth as well as shapes the character of our youth. This in turn enables us to grow disciples rooted in the faith and retain members dedicated to the fulfillment of the Great Commission.”

Looking ahead, Mowatt-Grant envisions continued expansion of the initiative across the Conference.

Church Confirms Five Adventist Deaths as Relief Efforts Expand in Venezuela

Leaders continue assessing losses while supporting displaced families across the affected region.

Five days after two powerful earthquakes measuring 7.2 and 7.5 struck northern Venezuela on June 24, the Seventh-day Adventist Church in the East Venezuela Union has confirmed the deaths of five church members as leaders continue assessing the disaster's impact across the affected territory.

The earthquakes left widespread destruction in Caracas, La Guaira, and surrounding communities, collapsing buildings, trapping residents, and claiming hundreds of lives, with many people still unaccounted for.

"We are deeply saddened by the deaths of our church members and continue to pray for the families grieving the loss of their loved ones," said Pastor Luis A. Paredes, president of the East Venezuela Union. Quoting Psalm 46:1, Paredes added, "God is our refuge and strength, an ever-present help in trouble."

As assessments continue, church leaders are gaining a clearer picture of the earthquake's impact on Adventist members and congregations across the affected territory.

At least 21 Adventist families have lost everything they owned, 156 families have sustained damage to their homes, and 175 families are currently living in temporary shelters.

Eleven pastoral families remain unable to return to their homes, while five Adventist churches have also suffered structural damage.

For church leaders, the response has become a race against time—finding members whose whereabouts remain unknown while caring for hundreds already displaced.

Assessing the Human Impact

“Our greatest challenge right now is locating every one of our members,” Paredes said. “At the same time, we are caring for those staying in shelters provided by the church by supplying food, medicine, and other essential needs.”

Despite the devastation, the church has reaffirmed its commitment to supporting affected communities and rebuilding lives, while calling on members throughout the Inter-American Division and around the world to continue praying for pastors, logistics teams, volunteers, and every family affected by the disaster.

In a message shared on social media, Paredes urged church members and the wider community to continue praying for those still trapped beneath collapsed buildings, families mourning loved ones, and thousands left homeless by the disaster. He also appealed for prayers for emergency responders risking their lives in ongoing rescue operations.

“May God give them strength when exhaustion overwhelms them, light when darkness surrounds them, and hope when discouragement threatens to overcome them,” Paredes wrote. “God cares for those who care for others and never abandons His people.”

Relief efforts began almost immediately after the earthquakes. Within the first 24 hours, pastors, church leaders, and volunteers from the Central East Venezuela Conference prepared and distributed more than 700 arepas to displaced families in Caracas. At the same time, collection centers were established at Adventist schools, conference offices, and churches throughout eastern Venezuela to receive food, water, medicine, clothing, and other emergency supplies.

Local church members across the union have continued gathering donations, which are transported first to Caracas and then to La Guaira, where the largest concentration of displaced families remains.

As relief efforts expanded, the East Venezuela Union headquarters in Montalbán received truckloads of clothing, medicines, and bottled water from distribution centers across Caracas on June 26. The supplies were transported to La Guaira later that afternoon, while union office staff prepared and distributed 100 hot lunches in some of the hardest-hit neighborhoods.

Across the country, churches in the West Venezuela Union also mobilized, organizing donation drives for food, water, clothing, hygiene supplies, and other essential items that are being shipped to the East Venezuela Union to support families affected by the earthquakes.

CHURCH COMMUNICATORS URGED TO SEE DATA PROTECTION AS MISSION, NOT BURDEN



MONTEGO BAY, JAMAICA — The Communication Department of the West Jamaica Conference recently hosted a webinar themed, “Guarding the Message: Ethical Communication in the Age of Data Protection.” Tailored for Communication Directors and media team members across the constituency, the overall objective was to help participants view data protection not as an administrative burden, but as a vital part of their mission toward responsible and ethical communication.

The guest presenter, Mr. Brendon Coleman, Data Protection Officer of the Jamaica Union, explained that under the Jamaican Data Protection Act (JDPA), personal data refers to any information that directly or indirectly identifies a living individual.

“ More than just names and addresses, this includes photographs, video files, Taxpayer Registration Numbers (TRN), and WhatsApp contact directories, just to name a few,” Mr. Coleman noted, emphasizing that media personnel must act as data stewards to safeguard this information.

To bring awareness to the Act and its implications for the church, Mr. Coleman outlined the Eight Overarching Standards of the Data Protection Act that govern live streaming, video production, and news writing:

1. Fairness and Lawfulness

Data must be collected in a fair and lawful manner. Data controllers must clearly explain to individuals what information is being collected and how it will be used so that consent is fully informed. Lawfulness is critical; processing data requires meeting at least one of six lawful bases: consent, performance of a contract, legal obligation, legitimate interest, public interest, or vital interest. Without meeting one of these, processing cannot legally occur.

2. Purpose Limitation

Data must be used solely for the specific purpose for which it was collected. If the church intends to use the data in a manner incompatible with its original intent, fresh consent must be obtained from the individual.

3. Data Minimization

Communicators should minimize the amount of data collected, gathering only what is strictly necessary to process a particular activity and nothing more.

4. Accuracy

Data must be accurate and regularly updated.

The burden of accuracy is twofold: it relies on the data subject (the individual whose data is being processed, such as a church member) to provide correct details, and the data controller (the legal church entity determining the purpose of processing) to maintain it.

5. Storage Limitation (Data Retention)

There must be a corresponding retention period governing how long data is kept, which varies depending on the category of data and the nature of the activity.

6. Data Subject Rights

The JDPa is promulgated to protect individuals. As data subjects, members hold distinct rights, including the right to request access to their personal data and the right to revoke consent at any time.

7. Security Measures

Organizations must implement both organizational and technical safeguards. Organizational measures include using church-approved devices, establishing clear frameworks for who has access to information, and creating breach-response protocols.

Technical measures involve using robust passwords, multi-factor authentication (MFA), and encryption.

8. Cross-Border Transfer Restrictions

Personal data cannot be transferred to a territory outside of Jamaica unless that destination has equivalent, robust data protection legislation in place. To ensure compliance, church policy strongly recommends storing personal church data on church-owned servers.

In his closing remarks, Mr. Coleman reminded participants that implementation takes time. "Compliance is a journey, not a destination," he emphasized. "What is expected of us is that we make small steps in the right direction on our journey to full compliance."

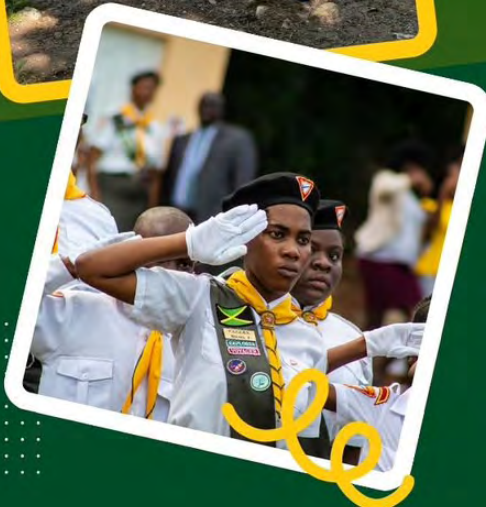

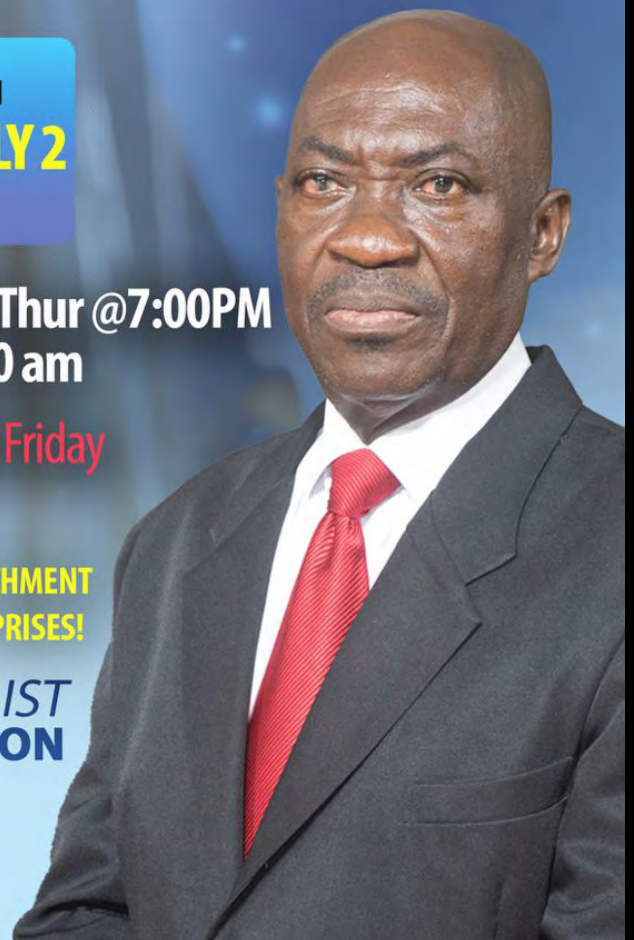
