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WEST JAMAICA CONFERENCE LAUNCHES BOLD “OPERATION FAMILY FIRST: SEPTEMBER TO REMEMBER” EVANGELISM INITIATIVE

OPERATION *Family First* SEPTEMBER TO REMEMBER 2026



MONTEGO BAY, JAMAICA — The West Jamaica Conference of Seventh-day Adventists officially launched its expanded 2026 flagship mission initiative, “Operation Family First: September to Remember,” on July 25, 2026, calling every baptized member and local congregation to unite in an unprecedented outreach effort.

Building on the successes of the year-long Operation Family First framework—which has already produced significant baptisms and life-changing testimonies—Pastor Donovan Williams, Vice President of the West Jamaica Conference, announced during the Online Worship Experience Program that the initiative is taking outreach “up a notch” for the third quarter. While members were originally challenged to reach at least seven non-Adventist family members through prayer, Bible study, and friendship evangelism, the campaign now extends that scope to neighbors, co-workers, and friends in every community.

“Operation Family First: September to Remember is total membership involvement,” Pastor Williams emphasized during the address. “We want every member to be involved, and every single congregation.”

Despite severe infrastructure setbacks—including storm damage to over 150 local church buildings—Pastor Williams stressed that physical loss will not halt spiritual mission. Congregations continuing active outreach under tents and temporary structures

were praised for maintaining gospel focus amidst adversity.

Underscoring the resilience of local members and pastors carrying out mission work without physical sanctuary roofs, Pastor Williams noted:

“Wherever a body gathered in the West Jamaica Conference, mission will be priority. Nothing can stop the mission in the West Jamaica Conference, and we are going to take it up another level. Wherever we meet, we are going to carry something in the month of September.”

Key Strategy & Implementation Plan

Adopted from an outreach model developed by the Harrison District of Churches, the conference-wide implementation plan outlines several core components leading into September:

Mobilizing Local Members: Each pastoral district is tasked with marshalling at least 100 members who will actively witness to seven individuals in their personal spheres.

Four-Weekend Evangelistic Series: Every congregation in the conference will host simultaneous weekend meetings through September. Friday night and Sabbath services will take place in regular meeting spaces, followed by outdoor community-focused meetings on Sunday

evenings.

Conference-Wide Online Bible Study: Beginning August 24, an online Bible study series will air every Monday and Wednesday night to support local outreach, featuring powerful guest speakers.

Baptismal Goal: Every congregation is challenged to win and baptize at least two individuals during September, leading up to a conference-wide grand baptismal day on September 26.

Integration & Discipleship: Newly baptized members will receive integration packages and be systematically nurtured into local church life, ensuring long-term retention beyond the initial campaign.

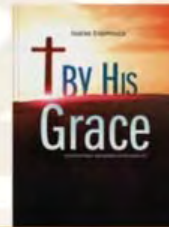
"If those who we have worked with, we are not able to baptize in September, then we baptize them in October, we baptize them in November, we baptize them in December," shared Pastor Williams. "And if the year ends and they're not baptized, come January, we are on the mission again."

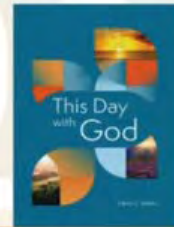

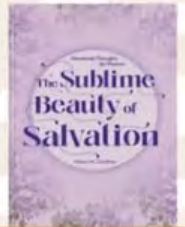

BETHESDA MEDICAL MISSION, WJC PARTNERSHIP BRINGS FREE HEALTH CARE TO ST. JAMES

MONTEGO BAY, St. James

Approximately 1,000 people benefited from free medical, dental and eye-care services during a five-day health outreach staged by the Bethesda Medical Mission in partnership with the West Jamaica Conference of Seventh-day Adventists from August 10-14, 2026.

The 41-member team of healthcare professionals and volunteers based in New York, provided services across three locations in St. James, including eye examinations, prescription and reading glasses from the Seventh-day Adventist Church, Mt. Carey, dental care at the Cambridge Health Centre and free cataract surgeries at the Cornwall Regional Hospital. The team also offered services in gynecology, psychiatry, pediatrics and rheumatology, along with an on-site prayer ministry.

The group arrived in Jamaica with a significant supply of medical resources, including medication and approximately 2,000 pairs of prescription and reading glasses. Dr. Roy Kellerman, Co-Founder and Co-Director of Bethesda Medical Mission, said the organization was originally established in response to the 2010 earthquake in Haiti and has since conducted six missions there. Following Hurricane Melissa, the group began exploring opportunities to assist communities in Jamaica.

"We heard about the hurricane, and we've been trying to get here for several months to help with challenges since the hurricane," Kellerman said. According to Kellerman, the team encountered a

significant demand for eye-care services, particularly among individuals requiring cataract treatment.

"There's a tremendous need for eye care, and there's quite a backlog for cataract surgery," he said. "We're hoping that in the future we can bring the surgeon back to perform even more cataract surgeries."

Dr. Kellerman expressed that the team views providing these services as an expression of their Christian mission to serve others.

"It's a pleasure for us to be here to serve this community," he said. "We feel it's part of our mission to be God's hands and feet in this part of the world." Coordinator of the Optical Ministry arm of Bethesda Medical Mission, Gustave Lescouflair, said many of the individuals seen by the team required reading glasses or correction for distance vision.

"People simply need to see. That's the importance of this trip," Lescouflair said. "We find that as you get older, reading and seeing tend to be a challenge. Eye care and vision correction are extremely important." For Mt. Carey resident Stacy Ann Fenaroli, the outreach brought needed eye care within easy reach. After experiencing difficulty reading, along with eye pain and watery eyes, Fenaroli visited the clinic after learning about it from a friend.

"A lot of us cannot afford to pay for the service, and it was brought to my backdoor, so I took advantage," she said. After receiving an eye examination and a pair of glasses, Fenaroli described the initiative as a welcome

service to the community.

"It was a good thing for the community. I really appreciate the team, and I'd encourage others to come," she said. "I'm very happy with my glasses."

The five-day outreach resulted from relationships developed between the West Jamaica Conference and church organizations overseas following Hurricane Melissa.

Pastor Vincent Rose, President of the West Jamaica Conference, said the partnership was among several relationships formed after churches and organizations from North America and the Caribbean reached out to assist western Jamaica following Hurricane Melissa. The mission trip was initiated by Dr. Michael Harvey, a pastor serving in the Northeastern Conference, who helped establish the connection with Bethesda Medical Mission. The West Jamaica Conference subsequently worked with the group to facilitate permits and other arrangements necessary for the team to operate in Jamaica.

He recalled that the devastation created physical, emotional and psychological needs among residents.

"I remember being in the field handing out food and people were saying they needed someone to talk to or else they'd go mad," he said. The President shared that responding to these needs represents an important expression of the Church's mission.

"Serving the community is ministry, and we make no apology for our approach in catering to Adventists and non-Adventists in the community. There are many who are still suffering, and whatever we can do, we should do," he ended.

"We welcome new partners in this issue of reaching people and meeting human needs."

Executive Secretary of West Jamaica Conference, Pastor Vencot Dyer, acknowledged the collaboration of key local partners whose support helped make the five-day medical mission possible.

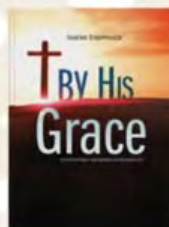
"I express appreciation to the Western Regional Health Authority for their support of the initiative and for facilitating access to the healthcare facilities used during the programme."

The Conference's partnerships have since supported several areas of recovery. More than 300 homes have been repaired, some completely rebuilt, well over 2000 care packages and over JMD 15 million spent on the recovery effort. The Conference plans to continue forging partnerships with local and international organizations with the aim of introducing similar initiatives across western Jamaica and reaching more communities with practical support.

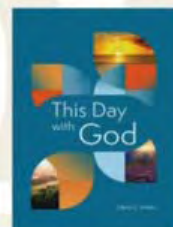

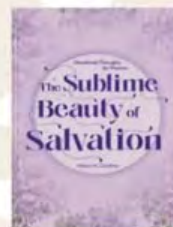

Inter-American Adventist Theological Seminary Celebrates Doctorate in Chaplaincy Graduates.

Nine church leaders complete pioneering program designed to strengthen chaplaincy ministry through research, clinical training, and mission across Inter-America.

The Inter-American Adventist Theological Seminary (IATS) marked a milestone in Adventist education on July 25 when it graduated the second cohort of nine leaders from its Doctor of Ministry in Chaplaincy program during commencement exercises at Montemorelos University in Montemorelos, Nuevo León, Mexico.

Representing Colombia, Haiti, Mexico, Puerto Rico, Trinidad and Tobago, and Venezuela, the graduates completed the pioneering program, preparing pastors and chaplains to serve more effectively in schools, universities, hospitals, correctional facilities, and communities. Church leaders say the program is helping reshape chaplaincy ministry throughout the Inter-American Division (IAD) by combining advanced research, Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE), and practical ministry. The program is one of only two Adventist doctoral programs in chaplaincy worldwide and the only one offered in Spanish.

For Pastor Hiram Ruiz, chaplaincy ministries director of the Inter-American Division (IAD), the graduation marked the realization of a vision years in the making.

“The dream of this doctorate grew from the need

to academically prepare leaders who could become instructors in chaplaincy,” Ruiz said. “We already had Clinical Pastoral Education units across the territory, but we lacked an academic program that would complement that training and provide the scholarly foundation needed for professional chaplaincy.”

Working with church leaders and seminary administrators, the Division secured approval to establish the doctoral program, meeting a growing need for specialized chaplaincy preparation across the territory.

“We wanted to make this level of education available in Inter-America,” Ruiz said. “We are completing the second cohort, and, God willing, we will begin a third cohort in 2027.”

Research That Serves the Church

Beyond earning their degrees, the new Doctors of Ministry in Chaplaincy leave behind research intended to strengthen pastoral ministry across the church.

Ruiz described the nine dissertations as the beginning of “a new paradigm” for chaplaincy in Inter-America—one grounded in biblical principles, informed by research, and focused on meeting people’s spiritual needs.

“These nine doctoral dissertations are grounded in Scripture and focused on the church’s mission,” Ruiz said. “Our hope is that these studies will be shared through seminars and training that enrich spiritual life in educational institutions, hospitals, prisons, and every place where chaplains serve.”

The research explored topics including transcendent resilience, the well-being of pastors’ children, Generation Z’s relationship with the church, school chaplaincy systems, student mission engagement, and pastoral care in educational settings.

Partnership Advancing Mission

Alberto Valderrama, Ph.D., academic director of the IATS Montemorelos campus, said the cohort made important contributions through both its research topics and the tools developed to support future studies.

“This was a remarkably rich cohort,” Valderrama said. “Their work addressed issues that directly affect the life and mission of the church while also creating instruments and methodologies that will support future research.”

Roger Ruiz, Ph.D, academic director of the seminary’s main campus in Puerto Rico, said the doctorate has strengthened IATS by expanding research into areas that previously had received little scholarly attention.

“Several of these subjects had never been studied before,” Ruiz said. “Now the church has research that can be replicated throughout Inter-America.”

The graduation also highlighted the ongoing collaboration between IATS and Montemorelos University.

José Luis Olmos, president of Montemorelos University, said the partnership continues to bear fruit by preparing leaders for more effective ministry.

“Every meeting, every agreement, and every effort invested in this collaboration has been worthwhile,”

THE REUBEN SYNDROME

BY ELDER TIMOTHY GUNTER- WATER WORKS SEVENTH-DAY ADVENTIST CHURCH

DID YOU KNOW?

Did you know that some of the most dangerous people in the church and the world are not those who are ignorant of the truth, but those who know what is right and attempt to negotiate with it? In "The Reuben Syndrome," Timothy Gunter addresses this spiritual malady—a condition where individuals possess clear moral conviction yet compromise standard principles to maintain popularity, avoid conflict, or stay in the middle ground. Drawing from Genesis 37, Gunter highlights Reuben, Joseph's eldest brother, who knew his brothers' plan to murder Joseph was evil and possessed the authority to stop it outright. Instead of standing firm, Reuben compromised by suggesting Joseph be thrown into a pit—hoping to secretly rescue him later so he could retain his brothers' favor while avoiding his father's wrath.

The sermon warns that this passive, indecisive mindset remains alive and well today, leading believers to choose delay tactics, human approval, and comfort over steadfast obedience to God. Gunter emphasizes that God calls His people to be decisive, highlighting that "conviction without action is documented guilt" and that attempting to please both the world and God ultimately results in losing one's identity and spiritual birthright. By contrasting Reuben's double-mindedness with the ultimate vindication of Joseph, the sermon serves as an urgent appeal to abandon the "Reuben Syndrome," embrace true repentance, and courageously stand up for God's truth without compromise.
